

Phoneme substitution: What word would you have if you changed the /m/ in *mat* to /h/?

a. Strategy to teach skill: Phoneme substitution is a skill that takes a little practice. Start by practicing alliteration and discussing the sound that is heard in every word.

1. Susie sells sand.
2. Freddy flips fish.
3. Tommy tried tuna today.
4. Dana dropped doughnuts.

Then practice phoneme substitution with the silly alliterations above (say these with your child):

What word do you get when you change the /h/ in hog to /j/?

What word do you get when you change the /h/ in hog to /d/?

What word do you get when you change the /h/ in hog to /l/?

What word do you get when you change the /j/ in jet to /b/?

What word do you get when you change the /j/ in jet to /p/?

What word do you get when you change the /j/ in jet to /t/?

What word do you get when you change the /j/ in jet to /l/?
